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Old town

Towns with a long history have an old part – with narrow streets, old-fashioned houses, magnificent churches, and stone pavements whose centuries-old cobbles have known the footsteps of many a monarch. Old towns attract many visitors from all over the world. Everyone likes to be touched by history.

If you thought the square was busy, in the narrow streets around the Gothic cathedral there is hustle, bustle and chaos. Locals and visitors press against each other: in the old streets, there is little space to move in. May we pass, please? Look for the chimneysweep. When you find him, grab one of his buttons and make a wish. There's an overworked businessman, struggling to keep up. Haven't we seen him already? Yes – here again are some of the people from the square. Remember Mitzy the cat, Charles the dog and Cecilia the mouse? Try to



find them. That banana skin is here too. Shouldn't it be in a litter bin rather than on the ground?

Streets

A town has many streets. As you know, some streets are narrow and old. Others are broad, with trees and lots of shops, pavements for pedestrians, and a roadway for motorists and public transportation. Like a square, a street has houses, stores, cafés, offices, and benches for pedestrians with sore feet to sit on. Streets connect different parts of a town, taking its people where they need to go – if the streets don't happen to be dug up.

There isn't much space for rest in this street, either. Because of all the people, but also because the street is being dug up. Hopefully no one will fall into the hole... Watch out, sir! The chimneysweep wants to sweep a chimney, but there's an animal in his way. Do you know what this animal is called? Perhaps you noticed the food-delivery man on previous pages. He's stepping on the pedals to get the tasty meal to the customer while it's still warm. What colour are his clothes, helmet and case? Do you know the name of the vehicle that has just stopped



at the traffic island? How many motor vehicles are there in the street? Where do you think the excited-looking kids in the high-visibility vests are headed?

Intersection

A place where several streets come together and cross is called an intersection. Things can get crazy at an intersection, especially when traffic is heavy – which is almost always. So it is necessary to follow all traffic rules to the letter.

Cars honk, engines roar and growl, people bump into each other. A typical intersection. There's a bus full of tourists. Can you remember which parts of town they have already visited?

Are there other familiar figures here, whom you have seen in earlier chapters? There are? Then try and find them all! Do you know what we call the white stripes on the road, and what they are for? A young girl is running after her dog, who won't be caught. Have you noticed someone being chased by police officers? The chase is easy to spot here at the intersection.



What are you doing, sir? You knocked the book out of my hand! Stop that man! That banana skin is somewhere about, as well as Mitzy the cat, Charles the dog and Cecilia the mouse.

Park

A town has many buildings, cars, buses, trams, roads, concrete streets and crowds of people. As for nature, it has a park – an oasis of peace amid the hustle and bustle. Townspeople go to the park to relax in the greenery. Some exercise or play sports. Others have picnics. The youngest play games. There's room for dogs too. It's fun to be in the park. Let's rest here for a while.

Now that we've reached the park, it's time to relax. We are surrounded by trees, flowers and shrubbery. Where the land is green, there are bound to be animals. This time, forget about dogs and other pets and try to find animals who live in the park. Do you know what any of them are called? Where did you first see the bride and groom? Can you give the young newlyweds a surname? Who do you think is the oldest person in the park? Who is the youngest? What do we call the structure with the gushing water? The overworked man sitting at its edge uses



his phone even when he's having lunch. If you're seeing him for the first time, you haven't been paying close attention. Find the chimneysweep, the graffiti artist and the banana skin.



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On hearing the word "town", we think of squares, streets, shops, cafés, buildings, parks and lots of people – all things that make a town a town. With this large-format book, get to know the basic parts of a town by joining our walk. As a town is all about its people, pay attention to those you meet in its busy streets. Some people appear on every page. Others appear a few times only, or maybe only once. Just like in real life! Follow in the footsteps of your new friends. Where are they headed? Who are they about to meet, and why? What is their story? Also, try to find Charles the dog, Mitzy the cat, Cecilia the mouse and a discarded banana skin on every page. We know you're going to have fun! If you wish, you can delve deeper by looking at the town's buildings, the jobs its people do, its transportation and signs, and all its (human and animal) inhabitants, and think up little stories for each. There's so much going on in this picture-book town! Why not get started straight away?
